Special rendering of some jihvamuliya/upadhmaniya characters

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This is with reference to my previous document L2/10-330R. Its contents in brief are:

In Brahmi and Sharada, the jihvamuliya/upadhmaniya written forms are observed to form a stack with the following consonant. The respective proposals of those two scripts had suggested that the sequence JIHVAMULIYA/UPADHMANIYA + VIRAMA + CONSONANT be used to achieve the stacking. However, the usage of VIRAMA with JIHVAMULIYA/UPADHMANIYA is superfluous as those two characters are always presented in these scripts stacked with the following consonant. Hence JIHVAMULIYA/UPADHMANIYA + CONSONANT should automatically be presented as the stack/ligature.

Now in feedback from an Editorial Committee Meeting, I was informed:

Here is a proposed text change suggested at yesterday's meeting. Let me know if this suffices:

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From TUS 6.0 p 346:

"Unlike visarga, these two signs are not combining diacritics. Instead, they behave like ordinary consonant signs, entering into ligatures with the following stop consonant, **without the use of a virama**"

However, this would be misleading, as there is no precedent for "ordinary consonant signs" to "enter into ligatures with the following stop consonant without the use of a virama". It would be better if the wording for the Malayalam dot reph be followed instead:

Unlike visarga, these two signs have the character properties of a letter, and are not considered combining marks. They however enter into ligatures with the following homorganic voiceless stop consonant **without the use of a virama**.

The same should be repeated for Sharada, or at least a reference to Brahmi such as "the Sharada Jihvamuliya/Upadhmaniya characters are similar in property and behaviour to the corresponding Brahmi characters" is recommended. Similar treatment should be accorded to future characters exhibiting such behaviour.

Now it is evident that such rendering would be considered "special", and hence the representative glyphs for such characters should be shown in the charts with a dotted While the Sharada jihvamuliya/upadhmaniya square. characters (see http://www.unicode.org/Public/6.1.0/charts/blocks/U11180.pdf) are shown correctly with dotted square, the corresponding Brahmi characters are not (see а http://www.unicode.org/Public/6.1.0/charts/blocks/U11000.pdf).

It is hence requested that the glyphs of the Brahmi characters be corrected to be shown inside a dotted square, and care be taken to ensure that all future characters of this kind be accorded similar treatment.

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
