Proposal

The Latin small capital Q appears in scholarly articles discussing Japanese linguistics. Currently, besides usual small letters, the following "dependent" phonemes are used in the linguistic literature: /H/ or /R/ for lengthening, /Q/ for gemination and /N/ as a syllable-final nasal. (For example, see the first footnote in Oshima [1].)

Generally, throughout linguistics, phonemic notation uses the following letters:

- small Latin letters,
- small Latin capital letters,
- notation borrowed from the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA), which when resembling capital letters are *small* capital letters and otherwise stylistically always resemble *small* letters (e.g. in Japanese, the phoneme /N/ is often pronounced [ɴ], where ɴ is the IPA notation for a "uvular nasal").

For Japanese, too, phonemic notation in all-small letters (including small capital letters) would be the most natural choice. Currently, a complete set of (traditional) phonemes may only be given as / a i u e o k g s z t d n h b p m y r w ɴ ɴ Q /, with no small capital Q. (Other non-traditional phonemes or different notation in the literature would include / š ŷ c č f j w /, which we note are all small letters.)

In fact, before Unicode, there are already publications using what should be LATIN LETTER SMALL CAPITAL Q, such as Akinaga [2]. However, for lack for a small capital Q in Unicode, many authors revert to capital letters for the "dependent" phonemes / ɴ ɴ Q /, i.e. writing the phonemes as / a i u e o k g s z t d n h b p m j r w H N Q /, which is at odds with the usual practice in linguistics of using small letters for phonemes.

(In fact, in the literature, capital letters are sometimes reserved for other uses, such as indicating morphophonemes / -Ta / or irregular conjugation / aR- /.)

LATIN LETTER SMALL CAPITAL Q

Previous proposal

This character was proposed for inclusion as part of proposal L2/11-208 "Proposal to encode missing Latin small capital and modifier letters in the UCS", which proposed to include *all* missing Latin small capital and modifier letters (a total of 19 characters). This proposal was not approved. However, we hope to have provided sufficient evidence that the proposed character LATIN LETTER SMALL CAPITAL Q was used and will be used at least in the field of Japanese linguistics.
