The following provides information for the MEDIEVAL COMMA, which was deemed eligible for encoding in the script ad hoc report in May 2016 (<u>L2/16-156</u>). #### **MEDIEVAL COMMA**

## **History and function**

Functionally, the comma is "a division of a colon... usually short and rhythmically incomplete, followed by a minor disjunction of the sense where it may be necessary to pause" (Parkes p. 302). The punctuation sign which came to bear the same name was employed to show a disjunction of sense, or a minor medial pause at the end of a comma. This was the MEDIEVAL COMMA proposed here. It was most commonly used by Italian scribes in the 14th century, and is the ancestor of our modern comma, whose modern form appeared in the first typefaces. See Figures below.
