

The emoji subcommittee recommends vendors with meteor-designs designs move that design to this new code point and redesign the existing comet emoji.


### B. Expected use


#### 1. Frequency

#### 2. Multiple usages.

#### Sudden Impact / Cataclysm / Collapse

Meteors are often associated with

- Extinction-level events (e.g., dinosaurs),
- Apocalypse, and
- Uncontrollable fate.

#### Transformation & Renewal

In some Indigenous and spiritual traditions, a meteor strike represents a moment of cosmic intervention — a rupture in time or space from which something new can emerge.

#### Speed and Fame

"Meteoric rise" = sudden success or attention, often followed by a crash.

#### Burning Out

They capture the idea of **something brilliant but short-lived**, akin to a firework or falling star.

Examples in messaging contexts:

Sudden drama: "She made a en entrance 🍑

Crisis incoming: "I forgot my presentation and the client's here.

Crash & burn: "Well that date went well until it didn't.

Big impact: "That speech 9

Short-lived intensity: "Their romance? Meteoric ●

#### 3. Use in sequences

**Destruction / Change**: Paired with or for to emphasize metaphorical effect.

## 4. Breaking new ground

 Meteors have darker, more dramatic emotional weight than / comets.

#### Scientific Distinction

The two represent vastly different astronomical phenomena.

A **meteor** is atmospheric and momentary;

A **comet** / is celestial and long-term

#### <u>Cultural Symbolism</u>

**Comets** have been seen as omens or messengers throughout history.

Meteors are tied to wishes


#### <u>Visual and Emotional Impact</u>

A comet expresses fleeting beauty, wishes, or dramatic change


A meteor's tone is impending doom

# VI. Selection factors — Exclusion

#### F. Overly specific

No, this is a fairly generic and iconic of how meteors are used in literature film, and comics:

#### In Literature:

"Meteoric rise" is a popular idiom in biographies or critiques of fame and power. Often used to signal foreshadowing, especially of destruction or major change.

In science fiction, meteors are often **carriers of alien life**, disease, or mysterious elements (e.g., *The Andromeda Strain*).

#### In Film:

Deep Impact, Armageddon, Don't Look Up — meteors symbolize impending doom, government denial, human arrogance, or cosmic scale conflict.

Meteors are a **time bomb** — you can see it coming, but stopping it is nearly impossible.

#### In Comics:


Superman arrived on Earth via a crash landing from the stars — essentially a meteor.

In superhero or horror genres, meteors are common origin devices for powers, transformations, or threats (e.g., Hulk, Venom).

Sometimes they represent cosmic randomness—a twist of fate that sets the plot in motion.

#### G. Open-ended

What about meteorites, meteoroids, and asteroids? At emoji sizes, these are sufficiently covered by existing space emoji such as a, b, m, m, etc.



#### H. Already representable

No. In fact, the lack of design consistency between these two concepts (comet vs meteor) has been cited in court cases<sup>1</sup>.

### I. Logos, brands, UI icons, signage, specific people, deities
