

# Ligature names in the Initial Teaching Alphabet

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[L2/24-273](#) requested several ligatures for the Initial Teaching Alphabet (ITA). It now seems that some of the proposed names were overly descriptive. I recommend making them more generic to accommodate allographs seen in recent publications.

In ITA programs over the past decade, teachers complained that the traditional ITA symbols were not sufficiently similar to the letters of the English alphabet. The shapes of several were therefore modified. Some were restored to forms they had had in the 1960s, such as <æ> and <œ> becoming <æe> and <œe>, whereas others were changed from stretched or lunate shapes to more typical ones. The words ‘stretched’ and ‘lunate’ should therefore be removed from the names. The word ‘digraph’ is probably also not necessary, except in two cases where it’s needed for disambiguation.

## Names to be changed

The ligatures below are set in (1) the serif PitmanITA font, (2) the sans-serif ‘Phonemics’ font used by the ITA Foundation until recently, and (3) the sans-serif ‘Phonemic ita’ font used today.

1DF5C	ee ee	ee	LATIN SMALL LETTER LUNATE EE → LATIN SMALL LETTER EE.
1DF62	sh sh	sh	LATIN SMALL LETTER ESH-H DIGRAPH → LATIN SMALL LETTER SH.
1DF63	th th	th	LATIN SMALL LETTER STRETCHED T-H DIGRAPH → LATIN SMALL LETTER TH.
1DF64	th th	th	LATIN SMALL LETTER REVERSED T-H DIGRAPH → LATIN SMALL LETTER REVERSED T-H.
1DF65	wh wh	wh	LATIN SMALL LETTER WH DIGRAPH → LATIN SMALL LETTER WH.

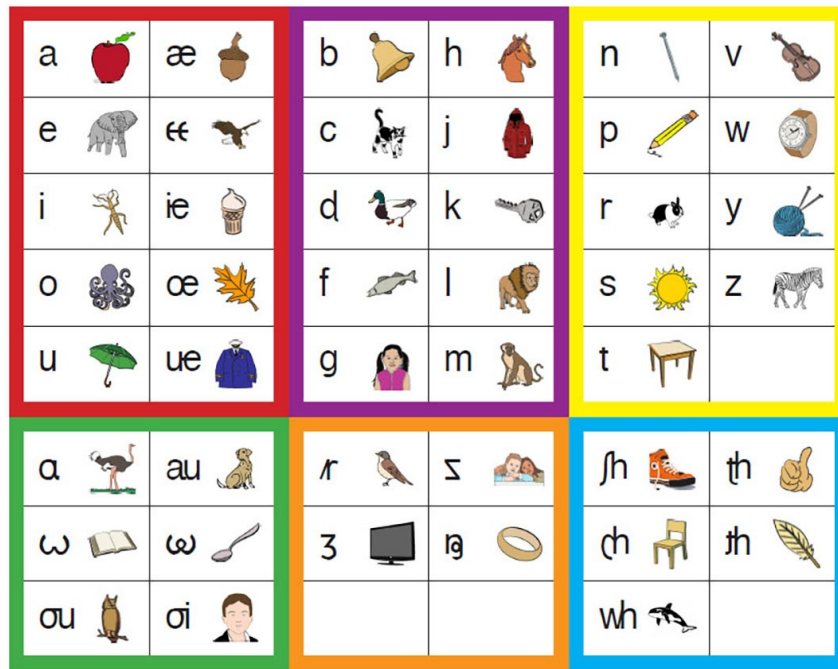


Figure 1. The typeface used from 1993 by the ITA Foundation of New York. This is still the alphabet chart posted on their website at [What is ITA?](#).

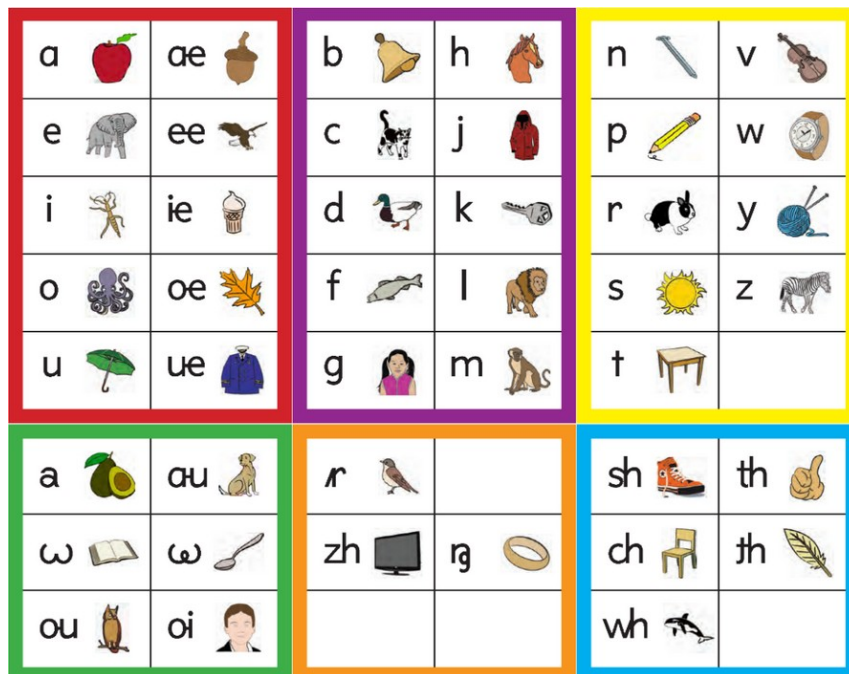


Figure 2. Anderson (2017: 54, 2025: 111) A second typeface used by the ITA Foundation since at least 2017 for a literacy project in Puerto Rico. <a> and <α> are swapped, and the ligatures look more like standard Latin letters. <3> is replaced by a ligature <zh>; this is requested in a separate proposal.
