1 Introduction

This is a proposal to encode a new character in the Sharada block of the Universal Character Set (ISO/IEC 10646). Properties of the proposed character are:

2 Description

The SHARADA SIGN SIDDHAM is a head mark used in Sharada records. It represents Sanskrit salutory phrases, such as *om* 'Om!', *siddham* 'established!', and *svasti* 'hail!'. It appears frequently in Sharada inscriptions. The sign corresponds to characters used in other scripts, such as U+0FD3 TIBETAN MARK INITIAL BRDA RNYING YIG MGO MDUN MA.

3 Glyph Shape




Figure 1: Sharada stone inscription showing use of the sign SIDDHAM (from Kaul Deambi 1982: plate 7). Despite the poor quality of the reproduction, the SIDDHAM sign is identifiable as the first character of the first line. The inscription begins "om | sam 58 vaiśākh śuti 7...".




Figure 2: Sharada stone inscription showing use of the sign SIDDHAM (from Kaul Deambi 1982: plate 5). The sign is the first character in the first line, the beginning of which reads "om sam 33 āṣāḍha śuti 15 śri...".

The representative glyph for Sharada sign siddham is \mathfrak{G} , as shown in figure 1. Variants are attested, such as the form \mathfrak{G} shown in figure 2.
