Most Ghanaians are on android smartphones and unfortunately there are several versions of android smartphones made by many different companies and only few support downloaded fonts. I think a keyboard will work better in this case. Please let me know if you find out how I can generate a keyboard input with the fonts as I am yet to figure that out.

Adinkra Alphabet encoding

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Abstract

Adinkra Alphabet is derived from Adinkra symbols. Adinkra Alphabet is a phonetic writing system for the four major languages in Ghana which are Akan, Ewe, Ga and Dagbani.

Background

Ghana is a sovereign nation in West Africa with a population of about 30 million. English is the language of instruction in Ghana. The four major local languages in Ghana are Akan, Ewe, Ga and Dagbani. These four major languages are spoken by over 90% of the population of Ghana. Ghanaians are familiar with Adinkra symbols however it is difficult to communicate with Adinkra symbols as they are not standardized. The creation of Adinkra Alphabet assigned specific phonetic character to an Adinkra symbol. The Adinkra alphabet still carry the meaning of the Adinkra symbol from which it is derived in addition to a phonetic sound and a numerical value.

Introduction

Adinkra Alphabet is a phonetic Alphabet system that are derived from Adinkra symbols. Adinkra symbols have been in existence in Ghana for many years. Adinkra symbols are a form of graphical imagery used in communication in ancient times. Each Adinkra Alphabet is derived from a unique Adinkra symbol. The Adinkra symbol is simplified for ease of writing in the creation of Adinkra Alphabet. There is a total of 56 Adinkra symbols used in the creation of Adinkra Alphabet. There are standard and simplified Adinkra Alphabet characters. Adinkra Alphabet characters are unique, and they do not share similarity to current Unicode characters. Adinkra Alphabet has large following and usage both in Ghana and around the world and a Unicode encoding will make it easy to transmit it's writing system in an electronic form. Adinkra Alphabet writing system was successfully launched in Ghana on November 6, 2018 at the Teacher's Hall in Accra Ghana.
