#### PROPOSAL TO ENCODE SYLOTI NAGRI SIGN CANDRABINDU

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#### 1. Introduction

This is a proposal to encode a new character in the Universal Character Set: SYLOTI NAGRI SIGN CANDRABINDU. It is used to write Sanskrit translation and Syloti orthography in Syloti Nagri.

## 3. Background

syloti NAGRI SIGN CANDRABINDU ঁ is the nasalization mark of syloti NAGRI U+A800 – U+A82F. It is very rarely used in fundamental Syloti orthography. Syloti phonology doesn't have [~], but we can find ঁ in some old Syloti primers. Specifically it is used to transliterate Sanskrit words and some Syloti words too. Prof. Erhasuzzaman's primer "দ্বনিষ্টা নাগনী ছিলটী নাগনী" 'Silåțī Nāgrī' beautifully shows that ঁ is the part of Syloti Nagri diacritics [see fig no.1]. It implies the central top position of questions as like as SYLOTI NAGRI SIGN ANUSVARA U+A80B ُ. For examples: তাঁ (উঁআ) 'ũā', দ্বাঁইতেঁ(হুঁএউঁ) 'hũeũ'.

Information about the origins of the character is unavailable. But, based upon graphical typology, it is highly plausible that the character is derived ultimately from 0 U+11081 KAITHI SIGN CANDRABINDU or 0

u+0981 BENGALI SIGN CANDRABINDU. It probably entered into Syloti Nagri through Bengali scripts used in Sylhet. This character also corresponds to ് u+0901 DEVANAGARI SIGN CANDRABINDU.

An independent encoding for is required in order to represent the candrabindu sign in plain text. While it is used for writing [~], the same sound represented by U+0981 BENGALI SIGN CANDRABINDU; it cannot be treated as a glyphic similarity of CANDRABINDU. This sign is required to represent historical Sanskrit and Syloti text in Syloti Nagri.

## 4. Collation

The proposed character should be sorted after  $\sub{}$  U+A82C SYLOTI NAGRI SIGN ALTERNATE HASANTA.




Figure 1: Showing the Candrabindu is the part of Syloti Nagri signs, from "দ্বীরপ্তী নাগরী" 'Silåṭī Nāgrī' (Zaman, 1995:3).[1]




Figure 2: Showing the use of Candrabindu to write ওঁঁস (উঁআ), from "দ্বীন্নান্তী ব্যাযানী দ্বীদ্যন্নন দেইন্না দ্বৰদ্দ ছিলটি নাগরি স্কুলের পএলা ছবক" 'Silåți Nāgri Skulår Påelā Såbåk' (Ali,1990:4). [2]




Figure 3: Showing the use of Candrabindu to write দ্বৃঁটওঁ (হুঁএউঁ), from "দ্বীরপ্রী রামসী দ্বিদ্যুরস দেটরা দ্ববদ ছিলটি নাগরি স্কুলের পএলা ছবক" 'Silåți Nāgri Skulår Påelā Såbåk' (Ali, 1990:4). [2]
