# National Status Report in Japan (Jan. 1997)

## 1. Revision of JIS X0208

The revision of JIS X0208 will be issued by the end of this January.

Main items of this revision are shown as follows.

- No addition, no deletion and no order change in the existing repertoire.
- Re-identified (re-justified) Ideographs.
- Re-written the text for adjustment between ISO/IEC standards JIS's.
- Add the SHIFT-JIS encoding specification.
- Add the RFC1468 encoding specification.

## 2. Study and development of JIS X0213

JCS committee determined to study and develop a new coded character set that will be implemented with ISO/IEC 2022 code extension architecture.

The committee plans the specification as follows.

### 2.1 Size

The committee plans two level repertoires(size) that will have 2,000 and 5,000 characters, respectively.

### 2.2 Relation to defact code environments

The committee plans that new JIS repertoires may be implemented on defact code environment such as Shift-JIS, RFC1468, etc.

### 2.3 Relation to UCS

The committee plans to propose to include it in the future UCS extension that is not in the present BMP and the IRG Vertical Extension.

### 2.4 Source repertoires

The committee plans to select the character set from the following sources.

- Signs and marks specified on the glossaries such as official document description rules, newspapers, etc.
- Ideographs and non ideographs used in school texts (up to High school text).
- Accented Latin characters and others used in European countries.
- Name Ideographs based on the register and telephone directory.

This plan of the committee is new put on public reviewing.
