

To Make Two G-glyphs Distinctively Different**By HKSAR**

Please note the G-glyphs in the following table:

As can be seen from the above, the two G-glyphs are very similar, if not identical.

It is suggested that China should consider the need of modifying its glyphs. One option is to fine-tune GKX0727.11 to make it look closer to the *Kangxi Dictionary* glyph (hence different from GHZ-21102.14).
